

Community is Essential for Making Disciples Discussion Questions

THE CONVERSATION

- In the opening of the podcast, we discussed four important characteristics of a disciple-making community. They were joy, hesed (love), group identity, and healthy correction.* As you consider these, please take a few moments to discuss which characteristic is strongest in how your church makes disciples. Then which one would you say needs the most growth.
- There were four shifts discussed that are needed to help churches become more disciplemaking communities.
 - From information to transformation
 - From attending to attaching
 - From sage to guides
 - From showing up at a small group to committed life together

When you consider the way that your church seeks to make disciples, which shift would you say needs to be a high priority for you? What are some ideas that you have to help your church make this shift?

 One of the questions asked of Shawn was, how important are the elements of honesty, conflict, and understanding emotion in developing a disciple-making community?

As you listen to his response, what stood out to you? And what aspects of what he said may need to be further explored in your church?

• At one point Shawn says, "If we believe that Jesus really transforms people, then we need to stop putting all of our energy into rows and put a lot more energy into circles."

In your church, what percentage of your resources and energy (time, money, leadership) goes into services or programs that put people in rows (teacher-focused spaces) and what percentage goes into circles (high group participation spaces)?

If you could instantly change one thing about your church community, (e.g., more hospitable, more loving, dealt with conflict better), what would it be and why?
